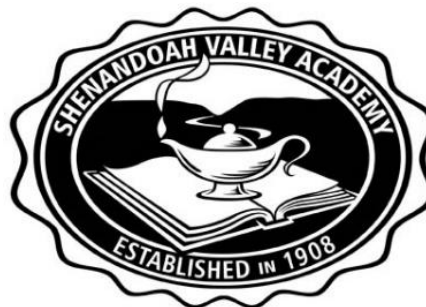

Community

Set in the heart of the Shenandoah Valley, SVA offers a rural environment for Christian education. Situated on 450 acres of fertile valley land, the academy is located on Route 211, one mile west of New Market, Virginia (population 1,732). The Civil War Battle of New Market was fought in May, 1864, just two miles away. Our campus is one mile west of Intersection 264 on Interstate 81, between Winchester and Harrisonburg, Virginia. The Shenandoah River forms the academy’s western border. We are a culturally diverse campus with a thriving English Language Learner program.

Mission Statement

Shenandoah Valley Academy, established in 1908, exists to provide a distinctly Seventh-day Adventist college preparatory program through experiences to produce disciples of Jesus who are compassionate citizens prepared for college and careers.

School

Shenandoah Valley Academy is a comprehensive four-year private, co-educational, college preparatory boarding high school enrolling 185 students in grades 9–12. The school opened in the fall of 1908 and graduated its first senior class in the spring of 1911. Shenandoah Valley Academy is accredited by the **Middle States Association Commission on Elementary and Secondary Schools** and the **Accrediting Association of Adventist Schools** and holds membership in the **Virginia Council for Private Education**.

Curriculum

- Shenandoah Valley Academy offers three distinct diplomas, Standard diploma with a 24 credit requirement, College Preparatory with a 26 credit requirement, and the Advanced Studies diplomas requiring 27 credits with additional higher level math, science, social science, and foreign languages.
- The academic program is organized on an A/B block with a total of 6 class periods per day. Seven credits per semester is the maximum course load without approval.
- These AP® courses are offered: English, Calculus AB and Calculus BC.
- Honors classes are offered in English III, Physics, and Anatomy and Physiology.
- Dual credit classes are offered in Religion, Anatomy and Physiology, Precalculus, and Personal Finance. The class of 2019 earned a total of 510 credits during their Junior and Senior years at SVA.

Rank

Class rank is based on a weighted 5.0 GPA scale. For class rank purposes, honors, AP, and dual credit classes have a 5 point weight

Grade Point Average (GPA) Calculation

GPA is computed using the above quality points. Beginning with grade nine, all subjects, whether passed or failed, are included in the computation. A minimum of 27 credits is required for graduation with an Advanced Studies diploma. A minimum of 24 credits is required for graduation with a Standard diploma. Grades are recorded on the transcript and GPA is computed in January and May.

Class of 2019

There were 61 graduates in the Class of 2019

- 24 earned a GPA of 3.75 and above
- 8 earned a GPA of 3.5-3.74
- 25 are members of the National Honor Society
- 47 students enrolled in college in the Fall of 2019
 - 72% in a four-year college
 - 28% in a two-year college
