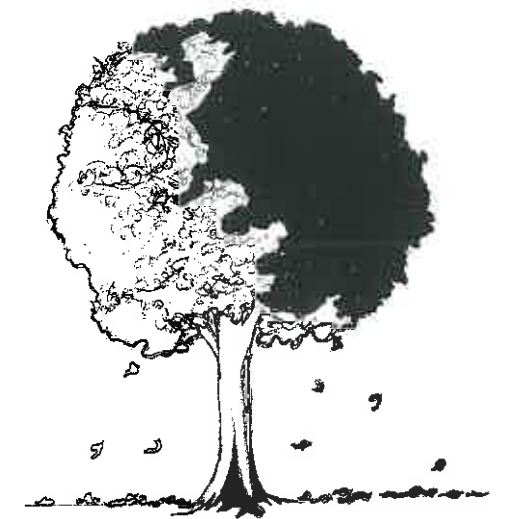

PULLING TOGETHER

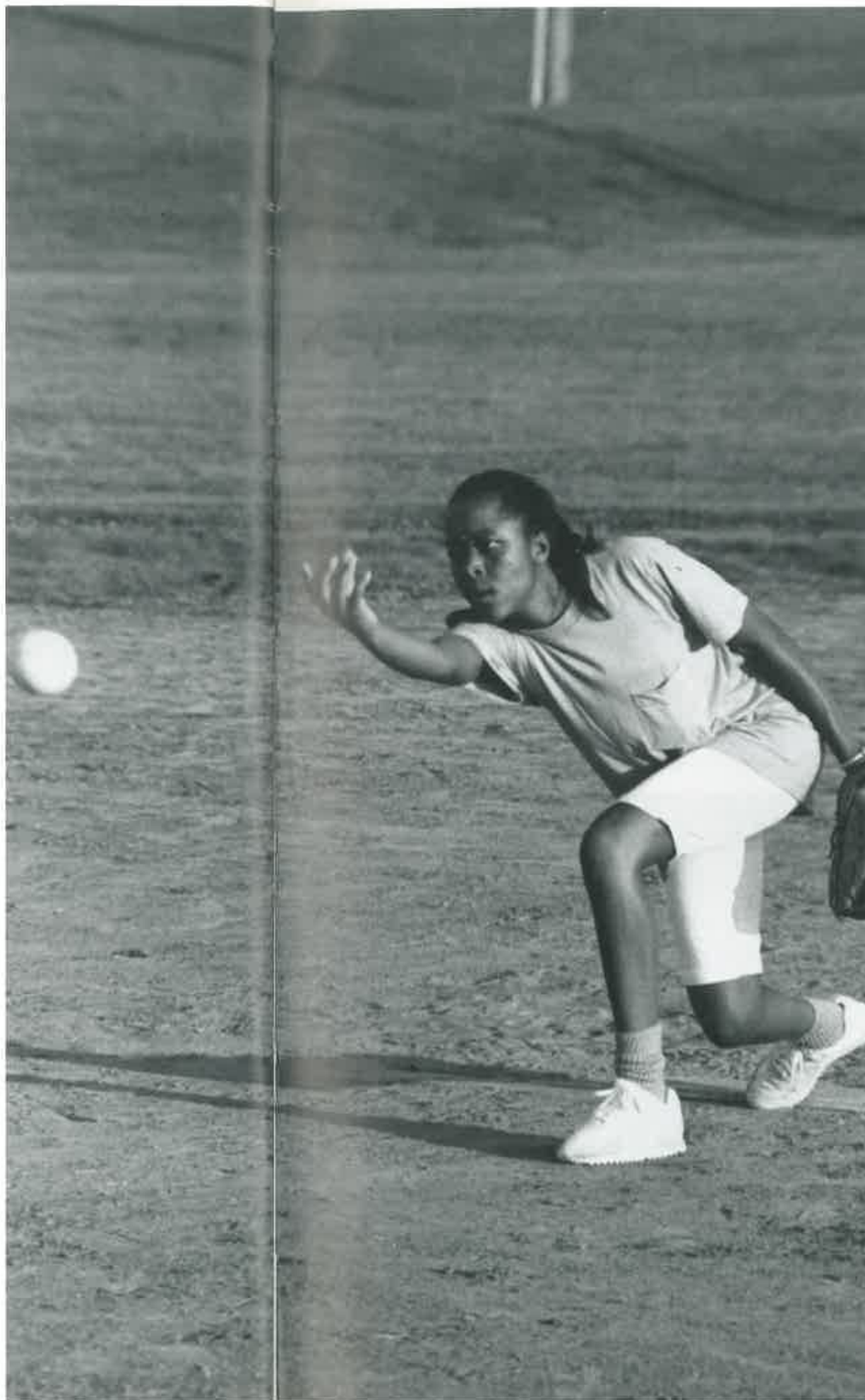
The day of the picnic began

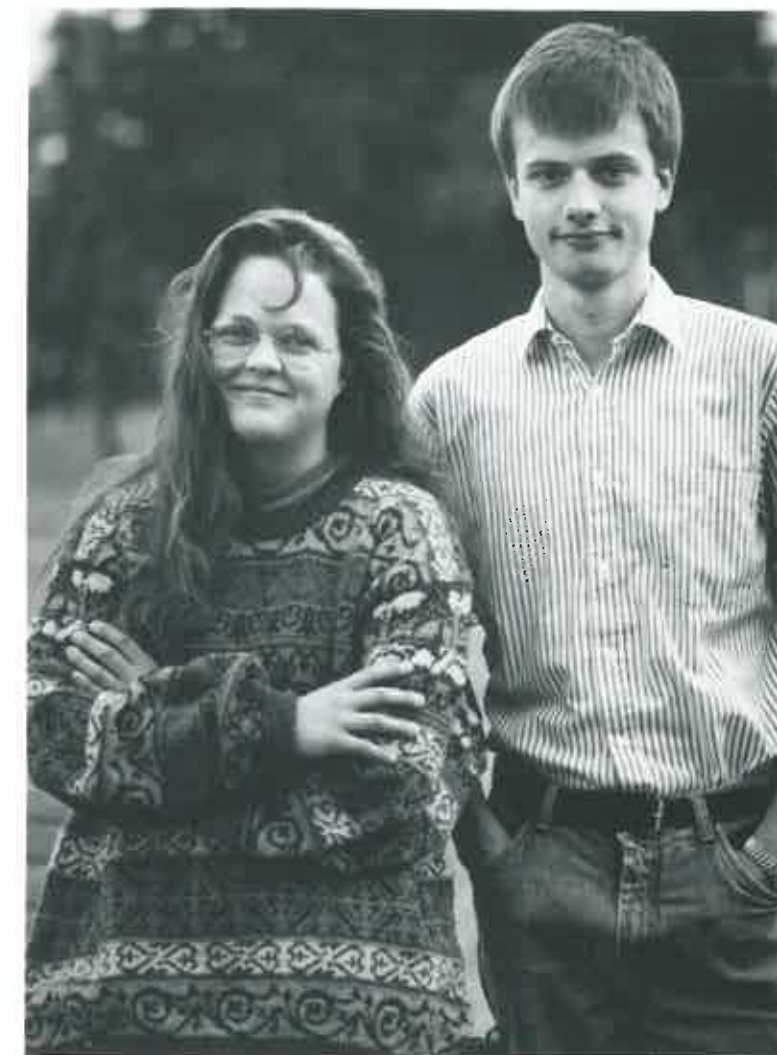

Cuatémoc

Mission Trip

Worried, uncertain looks graced the faces of sixteen students and six faculty members as they stepped out of the Boeing 727 and into a different world. This year's SVA-Maranatha mission group landed in Cuatémoc, Mexico a city where people drink water from barrels and dogs drink from open sewers. Potholes in the unpaved streets were about the size of the Great Arizona Meteor Crater, and your friendly neighborhood butcher shop was just a smell away.

The students spent their nights in what had to be the most beautiful house in the city. Here, they ate meals, had worship, dumped cold water on their heads, and longed for a decent shower or a soft bed. Each day the group was led down a long hill to the church site by the faculty members: Ted Decker, Bill Osborne, Pastor Lynn Schlisner, Skip Dean, and our own fluent Spanish-speaking, speedy block laying, furiously picture taking, and all-round fearless leader, Pastor Buz Menhardt.

The group built the walls of the church up to window height, poured the floor, and put the roof on. After a few hard days on the job site, they took a trip to the Aztec

From the pyramids, the students took their micro-bus to downtown Mexico City, where they visited the beautiful Spanish cathedral and bought many items from the street vendors. That same night the group ate at an American Restaurant and took full advantage of the porcelain toilets.

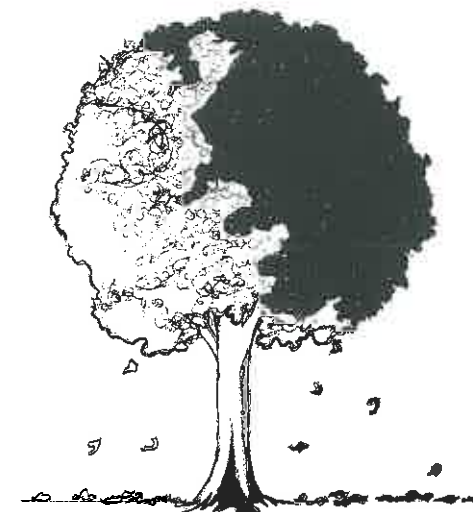

senior star Noelle Montesion when she said, "Drama this year, has been a very unique experience for me." In ending we look back and use the immortal phrase Lights! Camera! Action!

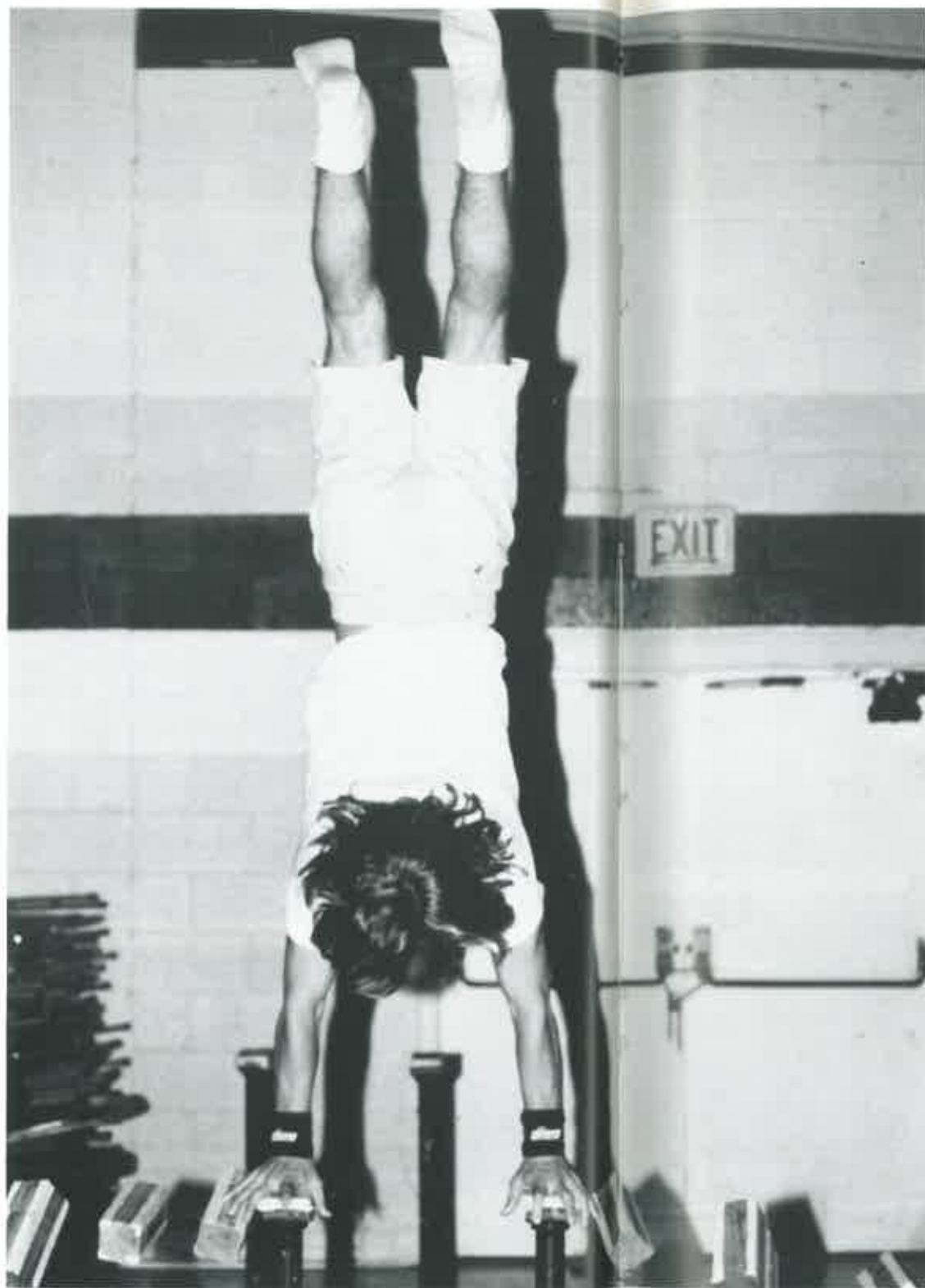

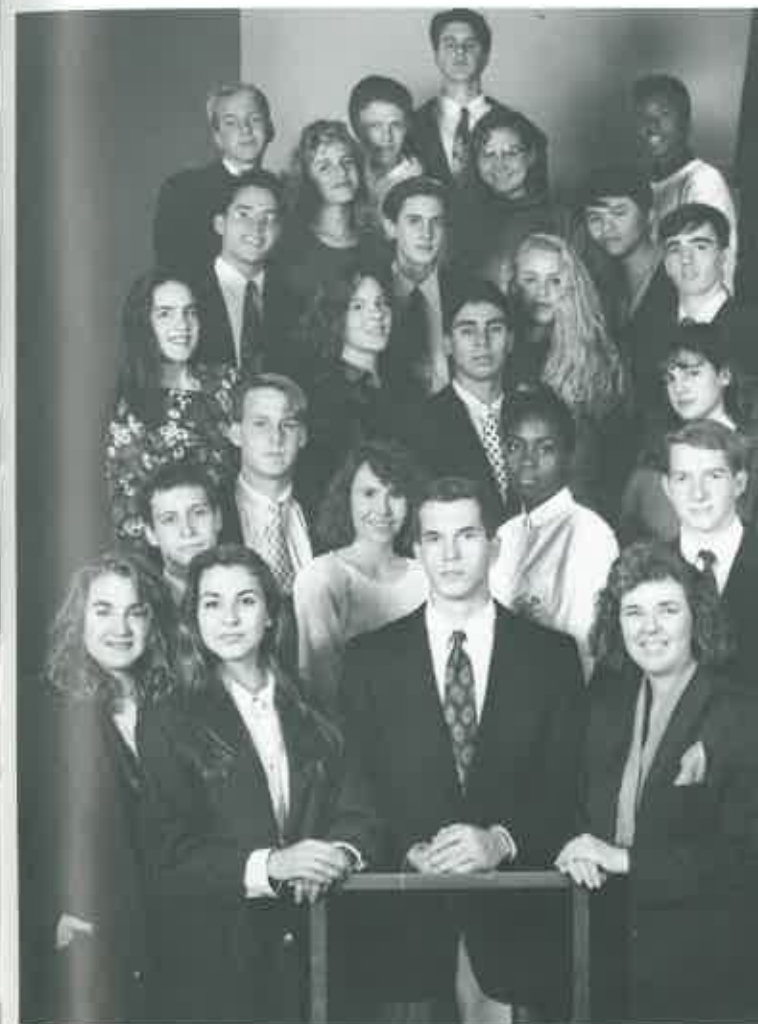
